We come again to Advent. A time of waiting, watching, listening. A time of remembering, anticipating. A time of renewal and wonder. What does this season mean to you?

Each family in the church has particular symbols and traditions that connect them to the season, the mystery, the story. This year in Sunday worship I want to celebrate the light that shines in and through each one.

"Greetings, favored one! The Lord is with you!" Luke 1: 28

Some of us enter the mystery through the nativity story; others connect to God through the image of our candlelight circle on Christmas Eve. Some spread light by volunteering on the coldest nights; others become angels of their own, bringing messages and gifts of goodwill and warmth to those with a little less; But no matter the story the message is clear: We celebrate that the light has come (and always will) and the darkness has not (and will not ever) overcome it.

On Sundays we will play with themes of light and dark, warmth and cold; watch how we progressively dim the sanctuary lights as we approach Christmas Eve and intentionally sit closer together. Forgive me if I cover your favorite pew with fabric, but the purpose is that we find warmth and light among one another. Use your hands to spread warmth and light — Hand warmers and flashlights (particularly small hand held ones and LED powered lights) will be collected throughout the month of December and donated to the Helping Hand Room for their very necessary winter support of our unhoused brothers and sisters. Listen to the voices of our church — as singles, couples, friends, and diverse households from the heart of Eugene lead worship. Join us as we play, praise, and make way for peace.

Spiritual Formation December 2019

"Mary kept all these things and pondered them in her heart." Luke 2:19

As we head into Advent, we are drawn into a time of increasing darkness, spiritual longing and anticipation of the Light to come. This is naturally a time when the days and earth grow quiet, yet our culture propels us into hectic activity. Taking time for contemplation, quiet reflection and prayer can help us stay grounded in the present moment – pondering the journey of our faith story as it unfolds, rather that rushing to the manger and Christmas festivities.

At the Annunciation, Mary had been visited by the angel Gabriel who told she should not fear, had been chosen by God and she would carry the Son of God – and she had accepted the calling. Her world had just changed dramatically. Mary had much to ponder. In doing so, she was practicing contemplative prayer.

Contemplation been practiced throughout the centuries and across religions. It has been defined as: to ponder or reflect deeply; to concentrate on spiritual things as a form of private devotion; to enter state of mystical awareness of God's being; to have intention or expectation. Christian contemplative heritage includes our desert fathers and mothers, St. Augustine, St. Hildegard, Meister Eckhart, Julian of Norwich, St. Teresa of Avila, St. John of the Cross, Thomas Merton and many others, including current practitioners.

Thomas Merton wrote, "...the true contemplative is not the one who prepares his mind for a particular message that he wants or expects to hear, but who remains empty because he knows that he can never expect or anticipate the word that will transform his darkness into light. He does not demand light instead of darkness. He waits on the Word of God in silence..." Here is contemplation as expectation, an opening for God.

The juxtaposition of dark and light is a theme in contemplative writing. Psychologist Sylvia Boorstein feels this time of year can facilitate a deepening journey, "Perhaps... these days of less sunlight are opportunities for more contemplative time, more looking deeply to see what can only be seen in the dark."


Love is often described as the central core of such prayer, either from God or for God. Meister Eckhart found it transformative, "What a man takes in by contemplation, that he pours out in love." Thomas Merton experienced God as love, "We do not see God in contemplation - we know Him by love: for his pure love and when we taste the experience of loving God for his own sake alone, we know by experience who and what he is." Joseph Pieper echoed this thought in saying that what distinguishes contemplation is a knowing that is inspired by love, "Without love there would be no contemplation. Contemplation is a loving attainment of awareness." And he saw this love as joy, "The common element in all the special forms of contemplation is the loving, yearning, affirming bent toward that happiness which is the same as God Himself, and which is the aim and purpose of all that happens in the world."



I definitely have my work cut out for me, but I'm very excited and thankful for the scholarship from the church! I look forward to sharing my continuing journey.

Since September I have been attending school at Oregon State University, and working two jobs on campus. I work at the Faculty Media Center as well as the Student Multimedia Studio. I am taking fifteen credits, nine of which are in my degree program, Digital Communication Arts. On top of those I am working on completing my baccalaureate core requirements so I am taking a German dictatorship class, and a women and gender studies class. From Bethany Waggoner:

My masters program has a mandatory summer placement, so I was abroad during the summer. I worked as a gender and organizing consultant at the Taghyeer Movement in the West Bank, Palestine. Taghyeer is a civil society organization based in the West Bank, whose mission is to create social and political change by transcending victimhood and practicing the values of good citizenship with integrity. Taghyeer's vision is to achieve a peaceful solution to the Israeli-Palestinian Conflict that guarantees independence, freedom, dignity, and a secure life for all. They work to end Israeli occupation and also to build more inclusive institutions and advance development in Palestine.

This fall I'm attending the School of International and Public Affairs (SIPA) at Columbia University in New York. I'm enrolled in the Masters of Public Administration - Development Practice program and specializing in Gender & Public Policy and Conflict Resolution. I'm also a Teachers Assistant for my program's core course on Sustainable Development Practice, a board member for the Human Rights Working Group and the Gender Policy Working Group, and an intern with the Peace & Social Change Fellowship program at the The Advanced Consortium on Cooperation, Conflict and Complexity (AC4). My courses this semester include: Gender, Conflict & Peacebuilding; Program Design & Evaluation; Mainstreaming Gender; Navigating Diversity & Inclusion in Public Policy & International Affairs; and Strategic Management for Non-Profit Organizations.

This summer was very special, as I got to visit the Holy Land and its sites — I even lived in that "little town of Bethlehem". Growing up in a church, you hear about all of these places in Sunday school and in sermons, but it is a whole different thing to go pray at the Church of the Holy Sepulchre or visit sites where Jesus taught. As difficult as things were given the tensions between Palestine and Israel, I cherished the opportunity to bring to life and make more real the stories I heard growing up.

Govs, Inslee and Brown Fighting the youth climate cases

In 2011 Kelsey Juliana and Ollie Chernaik filed a lawsuit on behalf of Oregon youth, charging then-Gov.

Kitzhaber and the state of Oregon with not doing enough to fight catastrophic climate change. Eight years and six court appearances later, the two, now college students are at a high school in Portland with Oregon's Supreme Court. A similar lawsuit is bound for a Washington state appeals court. Despite the two states' liberal legislatures and governors who cast themselves as climate activists, the cases have been met with staunch resistance, highlighting the tough sledding in the Pacific Northwest and the urgency of climate action.

At the core of the youth climate lawsuits is the claim that elected officials have failed to protect the public interest of future generations from the worsening climate crisis that scientists are predicting. The young peoples' lawyers argue, it's the courts' responsibility to demand that the state preserve a healthy climate for future generations by rapidly phasing out greenhouse gas emissions. In response the two states have defended their actions on technical ground, citing separation of powers and questioning the reach of the public trust doctrine..."The impression we're getting is the that the governors don't mind talking about climate change and taking incremental steps. But they're unwilling to take bold action."

Plastic Recycling Collections:

We collected and delivered approximately five cubic yards of plastics. We did not get an "A" like the Methodists did. We had to carry back two boxes full of rejects—some in the wrong number bags, but mostly in the presence of labels that were not properly removed. One box full was of Chobani yogurt cups which have shrink wrap which is easily removed. We want to keep participating in the on-going collections, but we will be rejecting incorrectly prepared items. Quite a few of the TV meal containers were unwashed, greasy. They were discarded. Sorters can't take time to wash and de-label items improperly prepared. So it's time to UP our preparation and get an "A" next time!

Please keep collecting #'s 2, 4 and 5, be sure they're clean and it's easier to remove labels in small amounts as you empty them. Pouring nearly boiling water into containers with paper labels and waiting until they are cool enough to handle usually makes them easier to scrape labels off. Rubbing Dawn dish soap into labels helps, too. Remember, there are an increasing number of companies using containers with "baked on" that can't be removed. If you can't get your fingernail under an edge, it could be "baked on".

AND lastly, don't bring in your plastics until we announce that we are starting to collect again. Our storage room is very small. While you're honing your skills at label removing, plan to help with the next collection when it's time. Phyllis Weare for Green Chalice
