**Dear Church:**

We are in Eastertide, when we rejoice in the good news of the resurrection, and yet so much our journey still feels like the wilderness. I continue to pray for you as we walk through these days of distancing together.

This week, some state governments are beginning to lift stay-at-home orders and allow some businesses and industries to reopen their doors. These reopening conversations are understandably raising questions about how and when churches should resume in-person worship services. These are difficult decisions, but I want to encourage you, as difficult as it is, not to rush too quickly back. It is not yet time to gather for worship in person.

I know that it is heartbreaking not to be able to gather. We want nothing more than to hug our loved ones and squeeze the hands of our grieving friends. We want nothing more than to worship together and join our voices together in song. We want nothing more than to break bread together at our beloved communion tables.

But the phased reopening plans developed by public health experts call for several benchmarks to indicate safety such as 14 days of declining case counts, widespread testing, and contact tracing. We are not there yet.

The economic impact of this pandemic is devastating, to be sure, and many of the decisions to reopen business are in response. There is and will be much work to do as we care for our hurting neighbors.

Church, we don't make decisions based on economics. We make decisions based on love. And here in this time, in the midst of this pandemic, the loving thing to do is not to gather for worship. Love, as we know from 1 **Corinthians 13:4-5, is patient. Love does not insist on its own way.**

It is not easy to love from a distance. It is not easy to overcome our own desire for being physically close to our church family. It is not easy to give up the familiar in favor of this new way of being.

**It is likely we will never meet in quite the same way again. But we have a historic opportunity here. We have the chance to test new ways, learn creatively, imagine beyond old boundaries and grow in our understanding of the family of God.**

Let me be clear: even as we have gathered in different ways, we are still the church. Even as we have worshiped on Facebook and YouTube from our living room couches, even as we have prayed over Zoom, we are the church, and God is at work in and through us. We will continue to be the church.

There are a number of resources available for helping congregations think through how and when to resume in-person worship services, and we have linked to several of them on our **COVID-19 resource page** [www.disciples.org](http://www.disciples.org). I found this guidance from the Wisconsin Council of Churches and this pastoral letter from Disciples pastor Brandon Gilvin particularly helpful.

In addition, this letter from the College of Regional Ministers offers wisdom and hope. Many regional ministers are also offering guidance based on realities in your local context. I urge you to listen to them and to be in conversation with one another as you make prayerful decisions with your church leadership.

I have been inspired by the creativity, innovation, and compassion from Disciples over the past two months. You are already imagining new ways of being church, and I have confidence that we will face the future together with courage and grace, strengthened always by the love of God.

This song has been stuck in my head. It was one of the early ones, taught to me by my Grandmother Daisy Violet Crow; at least I attribute it to her, because when I picture her she is seated at the piano at church. I still smell the wood and mildew of that small one room church house, still hear the echoes of the pianos, and I still feel the energy of the prayers and the hands laid upon me, and I haven't been there in nearly 20 years, plus those memories of laying hands are 35 years old. But still, I am there. Connected to my ancestors, connected through a song, a spirit, a prayer, a hope.

This song has been sung throughout my life: at church camps in Guthrie, OK and Okoboji, IA and Community of the Great Commission in CA, and at Suttle Lake, OR and every congregation I've ever called home. I've never had the second verse memorized but here it is in the hymnal today:

***When we are called to part, it gives us inward pain; but we shall still be joined in heart, and hope to meet again. Amen.***

At the beginning of all this, I imagined our return to normal in just a few weeks. I dreamt of filling the sanctuary with people joyously returning to worship and filling our bellies with food. I imagined the hugs, laughter, and smiles. I think we all realize now that it won't happen that way. Church life will look different and it will take us weeks and months to find that way together. But church life continues, we are being led by the Spirit, and we are not lost to one another. The energy and tie that binds us is strong. I feel your prayers, and Pastor Jerri and I have joined our prayers together now, creating a new bond for strength and discernment together. May God's love and the pursuit of science continue to guide us and may we continue to find ways to strengthen our connections to one another in this time. God bless you and keep you.

We will be doing prayer pods this year, but we're going to need to be creative in how and where we meet. When you sign up, you can choose your preferred method of connecting with others.\*


If you're new to First Christian, you might be wondering what the heck is a prayer pod? Prayer pods are small groups of people who get together for fellowship and spiritual and emotional connection around a book chosen for the church as a whole by the Spiritual Formation Committee. Pod members meet weekly for a few weeks and discuss the topics raised in their reading.

This year's book is *Acting on Faith* (2020), edited by two Disciples ministers. From the back cover: "In these first person stories from diverse voices of faith, learn how our different religious beliefs inspire courageous acts of justice and love amid the world's violence and divisions. *Acting on Faith* cultivates hope in our common values and encourages personal action through concrete examples of faithfulness, justice, and love..."

Each of the book's six chapters centers around a particular issue of importance to all faith traditions: environment, race, refugees, sexuality, women's leadership, and religious extremism. Each chapter is followed by reflection questions designed to deepen readers' conversations and understanding.

You will be able to register for a prayer pod via a link in FCCs weekly eNews or by calling the church office at 344-1425. The deadline for registering is Friday June 5. Sign up is simple and requires your name, contact information, and options you have for virtual meetings.

# Interfaith Family Shelter 2020


Thanks to all who donated to our week serving the Interfaith Family Shelter and supported us with your prayers. The shelter was so different for us this year!
