

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Minister s Moment with Rev. Dan Bryant

January 2020



At our late Christmas Eve service, I recognized one of the architects who designed one of the homes at Emerald Village Eugene. I know him to be a very active member of another congregation in town so was a little surprised to see him here. He told me that our service has been a tradition in his family for years and he'd have a revolt on his hands if they did not come! He's is not alone. For whatever reason, that service attracts more non-members than members by at least 3 to 1 if not 4 to 1 whereas the 7 pm service is more balanced, probably 50/50. Between the two services we see well over 200 visitors on Christmas Eve. That phenomena, though not necessarily unique to us, reflects a reality which from which we often benefit—there is an unusually high identification in the community with our church. We see it in the number of volunteers from the community that help with the Sunday Breakfast, that donate to our Helping Hands Ministry and that come to the monthly interfaith services and in many other ways. I often hear from community members, "if I were to belong to any church, it would be First Christian!" Doesn't pay the bills, but it is nice to hear.

Our reputation also comes with challenges. One of the most frequent things we hear from walk-in traffic is that someone was referred to us by another church or agency as a place to come to get help for some need, usually because they are homeless, at risk of becoming homeless or have some bill they cannot afford to pay. This past Sunday an older gentleman came late to our second service and waiting patiently in the back for the service to finish. He asked to speak to me. That happens on at least 1 out of 3 or 4 Sundays. His request was not the usual, however. He wasn't homeless but he was looking for someone who was, a young woman for whom he was very concerned. She had been evicted from the Mission for reasons he did not know and he took it upon himself to find another place for her, but could not find her. The more we talked, the more he became interested in what we do. "Look," he said, "I am a Messianic Jew and conservative Republican. [He ran against Floyd Prozanski in the last election for the Oregon Senate.] I probably wouldn't agree with many of things I heard in your sermon, but I care about people and I like what you are doing. And I would like to help you and I want to put more pressure on our city council to do more for the homeless in our community. Our lack of shelter is a disgrace and a human tragedy."

Living up to one's reputation is a big challenge. Sometimes it feels like peoples' expectations far exceed our abilities and at other times I am amazed at the ways in which we have risen to the challenge to answer a call. This Saturday one of our members, Marilyn Reid, has initiated yet another effort to do just that, responding to the call of Disciple minister William Barber to join the Poor People's campaign. (see the article on p. 4) Barber, I learned on Sunday, was recently named by one national publication as the 2nd most influential religious leader in the country, just after the Pope! It seems fitting for a congregation with our reputation to initiate such a local effort as part of a national campaign. May we live up to the challenge in the New Year!



That means that our church is already preparing for "transition time." I like to call it the "NO LONGER/NOT YET TIME". And your transition committee is already at work to help the church have interim staffing in place for it. Hopefully the following questions and answers will help everyone understand important issues about this "NO LONGER/NOT YET TIME."

*WHY DO WE NEED THIS IN-BETWEEN TIME?

+Time for our hearts and minds to say "Goodbye to the past" and Hello to the future."

- +Time to stop, look and listen for what's next for FCC-Eugene.
- +Time to search for the right other pastor.
- +Time to work out the possible compensation arrangement for our pastors.

+Time to determine where the energy / responsibilities for our pastors and congregation will focus.

*WHY DO WE NEED AN INTERIM PASTOR?

+ To give us time to do the necessary tasks of transition and preparation.

+To help keep the life of the congregation going on track and sustaining its ministry.

+To provide pastoral care and oversight for all.

+To bring a fresh perspective which can be helpful in our planning.

*DO WE NEED A FULL TIME INTERIM ?

+The more time the interim person is available the more the church is able to do the necessary work preparing for what's next

*WHO ARE THESE INTERIM MINISTERS ANYWAY?

+A "seasoned" minister who has had years of effective ministry and feels called to this particular task.

+A minister who has had special training/education and possess special skills for the task.

*WHY NOT JUST HAVE APRIL DO IT?

+There is too much to do and too many bases to cover.

+Good to have someone new to hear the concerns, questions, thoughts of the people.

*WHY IS THE INTERIM NOT ELIGIBLE FOR THE "REGULAR MINISTER " POSITION?

+The skill and gifts of the interim are not necessarily what's needed in the "regular" pastor.

+Interims are not seeking a call to a "regular: position.

*WHY CAN'T DAN BE AVAILABLE TO US AFTER HE COMPLETES HIS MINISTRY HERE?

- + The staff pastors will be our pastors and we need to look to them for our needs.
- + Experience shows that we need clear guidelines for this concept.
